2025 Legislative Session Review

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#### **Session Overview**

- The state's 2025 legislative session ended on time on April 27th
- This was a "long session" in the biennial cycle
- Legislature passed <u>423 bills</u>
- Legislature passed biennial budget that includes a mix of cuts, investments & new revenue
- Governor wrapped up bill & budget signings on May 20th





#### **Political Dynamics**

- New Governor, Insurance Commissioner & Attorney General
- Growing Democratic majorities in both chambers
- New House Health Committee Chair
- Interim agency leadership at HCA, DSHS & DOH
- Hot topics: housing, schools, public safety








#### **Budget Dynamics**





- \$16 billion shortfall over the next 4 years
- Without new revenue, potential for deep cuts - up to \$3.5B in health cuts

#### Different approaches to the challenge:

- Gov. Inslee proposed \$12B in new revenue
- Gov. Ferguson proposed \$4B in cuts but did not propose a full budget
- Democratic Caucus proposed progressive revenue options - some were rejected by Gov. Ferguson





#### **Budget Outcomes**

The Legislature-passed \$77B budget for 2025-2027 (SB 5167) includes:

- \$7.4B increase in spending over 2 years
- \$5.9B in cuts over 4 years
- \$9.3B in new revenue over 4 years

#### **Notable features:**

- Focus on maintaining services for people
- Preserves the "Rainy Day" fund
- Honors most collective bargaining, but includes 6% reductions for many agencies







## Revenue Package Outcomes

The Legislature passed several new revenue bills that were signed by the Governor:

HB 2081, B&O Tax Increase	Adds .5% B&O surcharge on taxable revenue above \$250M, from 2026-2029
SB 5813, Capital Gains & Estate Tax	Starting in tax year 2025, increases capital gains tax 7% on gains up to \$1M and 9.9% on gains over \$1M
SB 5794, Obsolete Tax Preferences	Starting 2026, repeals or sunsets various tax preferences, including B&O tax deductions, preferential rates, and exemptions (partial veto for community banks)
SB 5814, Sales Tax on Services	Extends retail sales & use tax to specific services, adds nicotine & cigarette taxes, and requires a prepayment of sales tax for business with taxable retail sales over \$3M in 2026
HB 2077, "Tesla Tax"	Excise tax on banking/sale of certain surplus zero-emission vehicle credits
<u>SB 5801</u> , Gas Tax	Increases gas tax by \$0.06/gallon starting July 2025 and 2% in 2026

   1,000+ Washingtonians in 2024 to understand priorities








#### **Cost Leads Many to Avoid Treatment**


57% of respondents deferred or delayed seeking medical treatment or changed their use of prescription medications due to cost in the last year.





#### Impact of Costs on Washingtonians

Nearly 1/3 of respondents had household medical debt, and many more faced other serious hardship due to high costs.





#### Other Access Challenges

Recently, **3 out of 4** individuals have faced challenges in understanding, using, affording, or accessing care through their insurance.

"Make it easier to access mental health care. It's extremely difficult to find insurance-covered care and there's a long wait list for the options available."

Recent improvements in coverage and affordability were at high risk of being cut, including:

- Apple Health After Pregnancy (postpartum)
- Apple Health Expansion for immigrants
- Cascade Care Savings premium assistance
- Medicare Savings Program expansion for elders & people with disabilities

Plus looming federal threats...









Together with our allies, we successfully averted numerous devastating cuts, including:

Apple Health/ Medicaid	✓Apple Health Expansion for immigrants remains intact.  But, unused 2024 supplemental funds mostly swept and AHE codification bill HB 1482 did not advance.
	☑Medicare Savings program expansion for elders and people with disabilities remains intact.
	☑ Planned expansion of Apple Health acupuncture & chiropractic benefit did not go into effect.
	<ul> <li>HB 2041 - Would have rolled back 12-month postpartum coverage to 6 months. Did not pass.</li> <li>12-month coverage remains, but funded at a lower amount.</li> </ul>
Exchange	🛮 Cascade Care Savings premium assistance funded through 2026, but not 2027. Funded at a lower amount.
	☑ Dedicated funding for immigrant premium assistance remains intact. Contingency plan for 1332 waiver.

### **Outcome: Affordability**



We supported 7 affordability bills that passed.

Stop unfair medical billing	SB 5480 - Prohibits entities from reporting medical debt on consumer credit scores. <i>Passed, Gov signed</i> SB 5651 - Permanently exempts \$2K in household savings from garnishment due to debt. <i>Passed, Gov signed</i>
Improve transparency	<ul> <li>✓ HB 1382 - Allows state's all-payer claims database to publish negotiated health prices. Passed, Gov signed</li> <li>✓ HB 1686 - Requires DOH to plan toward a comprehensive provider &amp; facility registry. Passed, Gov signed</li> <li>✓ SB 5493 - Codifies federal hospital price transparency rules &amp; gives DOH oversight. Passed, Gov signed</li> <li>✓ SB 5568 - Requires OFM to update the statewide health resources strategy. Passed, Gov signed</li> </ul>
Slow corporate influence	<ul> <li>■ HB 1881 - Keep Our Care Act, giving AGO oversight over health entity consolidation. Did not pass</li> <li>■ SB 5387 - Codifies the corporate practice of medicine doctrine preventing corporate interference with provider care decisions. Did not pass</li> </ul>
Tackle high prices	SB 5083 - Caps excess hospital prices in public & school worker plans, saving state over \$400M per biennium, and reinvests some savings in behavioral health access. <i>Passed, Gov signed</i>



### **Priority: Expand Access to Care**

#### We worked to address health care barriers, including:

- Preventing denials of needed care
- Maintaining health care rights in a volatile landscape
- Expanding universal access





#### **Outcome: Access**



We supported or improved many bills that could expand access, such as:

Care denials	HB 1432 - Improves access to mental health & substance use services in private plans.  Passed, Gov signed
	SB 5395 - Adds safeguards to prevent excessive prior authorization in Medicaid and private plans. Did not pass
Universal access	SJM 8004 - Legislative petition to Congress for a universal health system. <i>Passed, filed with Secretary of State</i>

## Public Coverage & Safety Net Programs

HB 1392, Medicaid Access Program	Creates insurer assessment to draw down federal funds to increase Medicaid professional services reimbursement. <i>Passed, Gov signed, fed. approval required</i>
HB 2040 - ABD recovery	Delays the elimination of Aged, Blind, or Disabled program payment recoveries by the state from Oct. 2025 to Oct. 2028. <i>Passed, Gov signed</i>
SB 5128, Juv. detention medical services	Clarifies that Medicaid reentry initiative applies to juveniles exiting detention.  Passed, Gov signed
SB 5232, HEN updates	Expands access to Housing & Essential Needs Referral Program & Medical Care Services. <i>Passed, withpartial veto of section that expands access to noncitizens</i>
SB 5577, Medicaid HIV antiretroviral drugs	Requires HCA/MCOs to cover FDA-approved HIV antiretroviral drugs without prior auth or step therapy. <i>Passed, Gov signed with partial veto of emergency clause</i>





# Private Health Coverage

HB 1669, Prosthetics & Orthotics	Effective 2026, requires group insurance plans to cover limb prosthesis and custom orthotic limb braces when medically necessary to participate in activities of daily living and certain physical activities. <i>Passed, Gov signed</i>
HB 1971, 12-month hormone therapy	Requires state-regulated private health plans to provide 12-month fills of prescription hormone therapy. <i>Passed, Gov signed</i>
SB 5084, Carrier primary care reporting	Permits OIC to require health insurers to report on their primary care expenditures. Passed, Gov signed
SB 5262, OIC statutes	Technical "clean-up" that revises a number of references & studies in statutes administered by the insurance commissioner. <i>Passed, Gov signed</i>
SB 5498, 12-month contraception	Requires state-regulated private health plans to provide 12-month fills of contraception, rather than just refills. <i>Passed, Gov signed</i>



# Long Term Care

HB 1142, LTC training	Aligns training & certification requirements for different kinds of long-term care workers providing in-home care for family members (related to WA Cares). <i>Passed, Gov signed</i>
SB 5200, Vets med. foster homes	Exempts certain medical foster homes for veterans that are under VA oversight from adult family home licensure. <i>Passed, Gov signed</i>
SB 5291, LTSS recommendations	Implements technical improvements to WA Cares related to recommendations of the long-term services and supports trust commission. <i>Passed, Gov signed</i>
SB 5337, Memory care certification	Requires adult family homes to meet certification requirements in order to have a memory care unit. <i>Passed, Gov signed</i>
SB 5672, Home care certification	Requires DOH to adopt rules to delay I-1163 home care aide certification requirements. Passed, Gov signed
SJR 8201, LTSS investment	Sends an initiative to voters to amend the Constitution to allow the state to invest WA Cares funds. <i>Passed, filed with Secretary of State</i>



# **Disability Care**

HB 1130, DDA waivers	Requires DSHS Developmental Disabilities Administration (DDA) to prioritize specified populations when enrolling clients in open home & community-based waiver slots. <i>Passed, Gov signed</i>
SB 5394, DDA no-paid caseload	Reduces DSHS DDA no-paid services caseload services, making them optional and more limited. <i>Passed, Gov signed</i>
SB 5680, Right to repair	Establishes a right to repair for mobility equipment for persons with physical disabilities. Passed, Gov signed
SB 5393, Closing Rainier School	Prohibits new admissions to the Rainier School after June 2027 and takes other steps to phase down the facility. <i>Passed, Gov signed</i>





#### **Behavioral Health**

HB 1287, BH disclosure	Allows the disclosure of certain health information by certain behavioral health providers for care coordination. <i>Passed, Gov signed</i>
HB 1427, Peer support specialists	Expands peer support specialists infrastructure, including changes to HCA and Medicaid managed care. <i>Passed, Gov signed</i>
HB 1811, Co-responders	Enhances crisis response services through co-response integration and support. <i>Passed, Gov signed</i>
HB 1813, Medicaid BH crisis	Changes the way that HCA & Medicaid managed care organizations interact with behavioral health crisis infrastructure. <i>Passed, Gov signed</i>
SB 5388, DOC BH certification	Requires DOC and DOH to jointly adopt standards for behavioral health provided to individuals in correctional facilities. <i>Passed, Gov signed</i>
SB 5361, ASAM criteria	Delays the requirement that MCOs and carriers use ASAM 4 criteria as the utilization management standard until Jan. 2028. <i>Passed, Gov signed</i>
<u>SB 5696</u> , MH Tax	Expands uses of the mental health & chem. dependency sales & use tax. Passed, Gov signed



# Health Care Delivery System

HB 1186, Medication dispensing	Expands the situations in which medications can be dispensed or delivered from hospitals and health care entities. <i>Passed, Gov signed</i>
HB 1706, Prior auth API timelines	Delays the implementation of application programming interfaces for prior authorization to align with federal guidelines. <i>Passed, Gov signed</i>
SB 5122, Merger notification	Requires entities filing Hart-Scott-Rodino pre-merger antitrust paperwork with the federal government to file with the state in certain circumstances. <i>Passed, Gov signed</i>
SB 5118, International medical graduates	Updates the requirements for the clinical experience license for international medical graduates. <i>Passed, Gov signed</i>
SB 5579, Contract negotiations	Prohibits health insurers, facilities, and providers from making public statements of potential or planned contract terminations unless it satisfies a legal obligation. <i>Passed, Gov signed</i>





#### **Public Health**

HB 1531, Evidence- based public health	Preserving the ability of public officials to address communicable diseases by requiring public health responses to be guided by science. <i>Passed, Gov signed</i>
HB 1720, Community medication assistance	Expanding the authority of non-practitioners to assist people with prefilled insulin syringes and other self-injectables. <i>Passed, Gov signed</i>
SB 5244, WIC blood screening	Allows Women, infants, and Children (WIC) program staff to perform certain hematological screening tests related to iron deficiency. <i>Passed, Gov signed</i>
SB 5455, Cancer research endowment	Makes technical changes to the administration of the Andy Hill cancer research endowment. <i>Passed, Gov signed</i>





# Reproductive Health

HB 1215, Pregnancy advance directive	Removes pregnancy exception from the model advance health care directive form under the natural death act. <i>Passed, Gov signed</i>
HB 1296, Public education	Makes changes to the parental rights initiative (I-2081) for children in public schools, including conforming to previous mature minor doctrine. <i>Passed, Gov signed</i>
SB 5093, Dignity in pregnancy loss	Repeals the crime of concealed birth and makes related changes. Passed, Gov signed
SB 5632, Shield law refinements	Clarifies the previous "Shield Law," related to protecting confidentiality of records & information from another state's reproductive enforcement laws. <i>Passed, Gov signed</i>
SB 5557, EMTALA	Aims to codify federal protections for pregnant people seeking emergency treatment. Passed, Gov signed





#### **Notable Bills That Did Not Pass**

HB 1291 - Concerning cost sharing for maternity services.

HB 1445/SB 5233 - Washington Health Trust, related to single payer/universal health care.

HB 1743, Enhancing opportunities for community-based providers to provide health care services in carceral settings.

HB 2073/SB 5808 - Funding Cascade Care Savings by assessing insurers' excess accumulated surplus funds.

SB 5124 - Establishing network adequacy standards for skilled nursing facilities and rehabilitation hospitals.

<u>SB 5331</u> - Strengthening consumer protection through increased insurer accountability for violations of the insurance code.

<u>SB 5258</u> - Implementing state auditor recommendations for reducing improper Medicaid concurrent enrollment payments. *(concerning bill)* 

<u>SJM 8002</u> - Joint memorial to Congress regarding concerns with Medicare Advantage plans.





### Select Other Health Budget Highlights\*

\*Non-exhaustive, with a focus on the operating budget.

Governor vetoed a number of funding earmarks for small health-related programs & specific organizations, veto message <a href="here">here</a>.



#### Apple Health Reimbursement Changes

The Legislature's budget reduced some reimbursement rates in Apple Health, which could impact access:

- Reduces managed care organization capitation rates for physical & behavioral health services by 1%, starting in 2026.
- Partially rolls back recent adult & pediatric dental rate increases, except for Access to Baby and Child Dentistry services for certain children, starting in 2025.
- Sets fee-for-service lab rates at 80% of Medicare rates starting in 2026, and requires managed care organizations to use this schedule as a ceiling.
- Eliminates reimbursement for hospital ancillary services (labs, therapy, etc.) for hospital patients in administrative day stays.
- Reduces previous funding to increase the number & payment rate of children's long-term inpatient (CLIP) beds.
- Assumes savings from purchasing incontinence & urinary supplies through a value-based purchasing contract.





#### Other Notable Health Reductions

- Reduces Abortion Access Project enhanced funding to retain reproductive health providers by 55%. (DOH)
- Reduces funding to Rainier School, related to planned wind-down but also increases funding to community
  placement alternatives such as State-Operated Living Alternatives. (DSHS)
- Assumes delay in implementing application for a Katie Beckett 1115 waiver. (HCA/DSHS)
- Reduces funding for behavioral health in a number of areas, including BH housing & eliminating homeless respite care. (multiple)
- Reduces funding to Area Agencies on Aging case management & nursing. (DSHS)
- Reduces funding to the Health Care Cost Transparency Board and Universal Health Care Commission, though the UHCC received some transfer funds from OIC. (HCA)
- Reduces some funding to Office of Equity. (GOV)





#### Other Notable Health Investments & Provisos

- Directs entities that contract with the state to notify agencies of federal agency/law enforcement requests related to private health data for non-citizens or sensitive reproductive health services. (multiple)
- Funds application for a federal waiver to allow Apple Health payment for tribal traditional healing practices. (HCA)
- Funds to defray the cost of services in Exchange plans if federal law prohibits the inclusion of certain services, such
  as gender-affirming care, in the Essential Health Benefits package. (OIC)
- Funds eligibility & enrollment infrastructure, including:
  - Automated solution to streamline coverage transitions between Apple Health & Healthplanfinder. (HBE)
  - Medicaid Asset Verification System improvements. (HCA)
  - Transition of Apple Health Classic population to Healthplanfinder instead of Washington Connection. (multiple)
  - Implementation of federal eligibility & enrollment and home & community-based services rules. (Multiple)
- Behavioral health investments, such as start-up costs & operational support for 3 Crisis Relief Centers. (multiple)
- Investments in long-term care, such as some rate increases for home care, some assisted living facilities, & community residential services. (DSHS)
- Funds items from the opioid settlement account, such as the tele-buprenorphine hotline. (DOH)



#### On the Horizon

- Federal changes to Medicaid, Medicaid & Affordable Care Act programs
- Federal changes to public health & health research funding
- State legislator changes
